## Front-door service

BACK ALLEY BAKERY

NOW ACCESSIBLE

For the last few years, people seeking a fresh loaf of brick oven bread had to wander down an alley in downtown Hastings.

That all changed this morning when the new front doors of the Back Alley Bakery at 609 W. Second St. opened.

The bakery, owned by John and Charlotte Hamburger, has operated for the last few years behind the Great Dames store, which closed in January.

When that business closed, Charlotte said they decided it was time to take the bakery to the next level and expand it out to Second Street.

"We decided we had a chance to really do this," she said.

So for the last six months, John, a contractor, has been renovating the old storefront, reinstalling the old tin ceiling, removing plaster from a brick wall and exposing the old wooden floor.

And if it's not the smell of the bread, it will be all of John's hard work and Charlotte's designer eye that people will notice in the new Back Alley Bakery.

There's the high, tin ceiling, bright red mismatched tables and chairs, various pieces of old furniture and ornate red flowered wallpaper.

John was quick to mention that all the pieces have a history. The tin ceilings are original to the building. The woodwork came from John Chris's office building just a few storefronts down. The windows in the kitchen area came from John's own front porch, and the furniture has come from all over the area.

"There's very little new material in here," Charlotte said.

Among the few new pieces that most people won't even notice, she said, are the black columns running down the two side walls. John, a contractor, built the columns as a way to hide the conduits used for the electrical outlets, which originally came up through the floor.

The Hamburgers both agreed that they wanted to use recycled materials throughout the building. All the kitchen appliances are used, and the bathroom decorations either came from Goodwill or an antique store.

Don't think that with all these changes the bakery will be a whole new place, however.

"We're going to make sure that we protect the integrity of the bakery by just doing what we're doing plus a couple more things," Charlotte said.

All of the locally grown and organic ingredients still are there, and they are adding a few more locally grown products to their menu, they said.

The grains for all of the bread and pastries come from The Grain Place in Marquette, an international dealer of organic grains.

"So it's grown in the fields around here. It's organic and it's milled right here to be made into bread," Charlotte said. "You can't get more local and healthy than that."

The bakery also will be selling a variety of Nebraska-made products, including some of the grains, teas and organic juices and cheeses.

And within the next month or two, the Hamburgers also plan to start serving lunches at the bakery made with organic ingredients.

Charlotte said that while the size of the bakery is bigger, this will still be the same Back Alley Bakery people have come to expect.

And while customers now will enter the bakery from Second Street, John said he's sticking with the bakery's name.

"The oven is still there. We will just have a front entrance to the Back Alley Bakery," he said.

High court:  
State allowed  
harassment

**LINCOLN** — State government was at fault for allowing a female employee to be sexually harassed, the Nebraska Supreme Court ruled Friday in what is believed to be the state's first high-court test of a landmark legal precedent set a decade ago.

"If employers don't want to see me, or a lawyer like me, in court, they will take a copy of this court decision and have it distributed to their managers, employees, and all their supervisors and require them to read it," said Lincoln attorney Kathleen Neary. "You cannot treat female employees with disrespect, and you must take complaints of sexual harassment ... seriously."

The state Supreme Court said that the Department of Correctional Services didn't take complaints lodged by warehouse worker Andrea Lacey, Neary's client, seriously enough five years ago. And in defending the corrections' department, Attorney General Jon Bruning's office failed to show that it passed a two-pronged test that determines whether employers are liable for sexual harassment committed by supervisors, the court said.

Bruning's office declined to comment on the decision and answer questions, including whether he thought the corrections' department handled the

harassment claim appropriately. The corrections' department also refused to comment.

Lacey's supervisor, Jeff Drager, testified that he tried to create a "fun" atmosphere at the corrections' department warehouse by encouraging employees to joke with one another.

"This joking consisted of sexual comments and questions directed toward Lacey that started within two weeks of the beginning of her employment," in early 2004, Judge John Wright wrote in the opinion for the court. "Examples of Drager's behavior include asking Lacey how often she and her boyfriend had sex, asking her questions about oral sex with her boyfriend, asking Lacey whether she had sex in the parking lot, and asking whether she had sex when she went home."

The conduct continued for several months. Six months after she started the job, Lacey told the warehouse manager she was fed up and was going to quit.

She was told by an administrator that the department had no tolerance for such behavior and to go back to work. Lacey believed the situation would be resolved.

Instead, she continued to work with Drager for 40 hours a week. A month later, Drager was ordered to stay away from Lacey and told that he was no longer her supervisor.
